DREAMS CAME TRUE

The fulfillment of his dream started in 1903, when William Fox invested his hard-earned savings. amounting to \$1,000, in a penny arcade at 700 Broadway in Brooklyn. For many weeks business was at a low ebb; the venture showed nothing but losses. But Fox was equal to the occasion, changed the style of entertainment and made it a success. Soon he purchased two more penny arcades and made a success of all of them. Next the youth leased the Dewey and Gotham theaters in New York and the public began to ask who this man William Fox

This was the start, and soon the Fox theatrical holdings were increasing steadily but always by careful and strategic moves. With a growing chain of theatres to be furnished with pictures, Fox began to find that the supply of films for himself and other exhibitors was both inadequate and unsatisfactory. so he started forming his own producing company.

Several companies were formed but it was not until 1915 that the Fox Film Corporation as it now exists started functioning. The plans


