

NEW THEATER HAS MODEL STAGE CONTROL SYSTEM

Armstrong-Power Studios Install New System to Shift Scenery.

hang over the Grand-Lake stage, was produced by the Armstrong-Power Studios. This company also installed the Apro Counterweight system, which was invented for centralized, complete and noiseless control for stage equipment. It is tated that within the last few sears 95 per cent of the theaters on the western coast have installed this system and that the modern playhouses of the entire country are employing it. A description of the system reads:

"The system eliminates clumsy, old-fashioned devices operated by crews of "flymen." In lieu of sandbags and the human counterweights that formerly rode down fly lines to raise curtains and scene pieces, are steel weights, so arranged on ropes, pulleys and mechanical devices that the curtains are lifted and lowered under uniform tension, smoothly noiselessly, without jerking and at an even speed. The Arpo Couterweight is also used to operate heavy stage lighting and other fixtures. The invention has made stage operation swifter, safer, more economical, more efficient and scientific.
